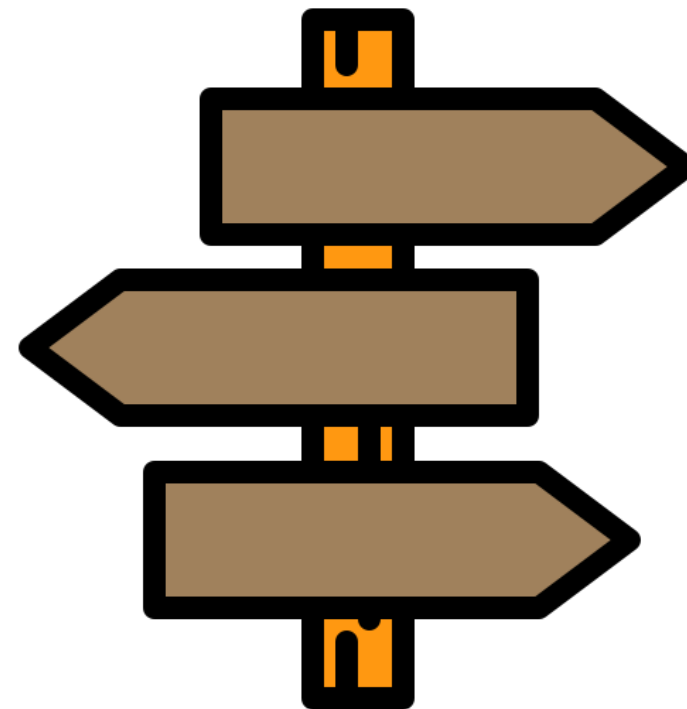
Display Slips

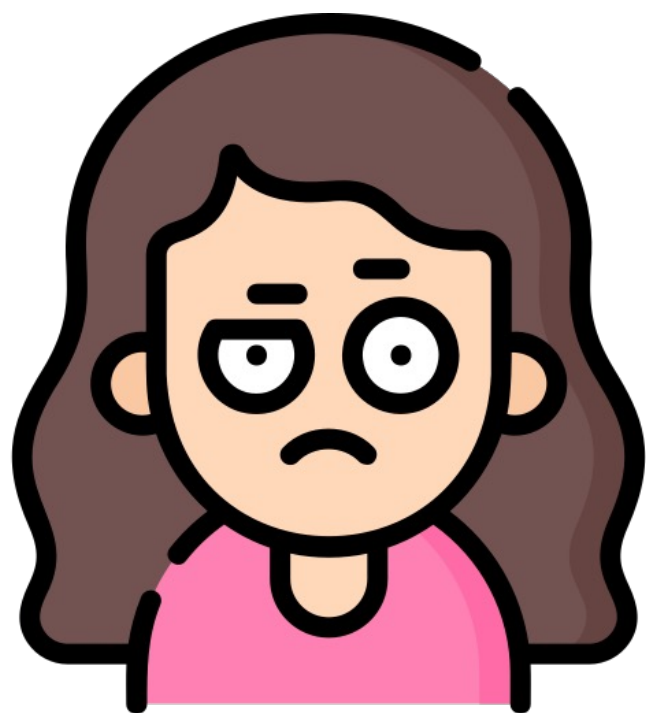
